Through this new program, Interface will engage school personnel and parents countywide about the impact of wildfire-related trauma and the warning signs of trauma on youth (K-12). In addition to educating individuals, Interface will provide evidence-based mental health services to students impacted by the 2018 Thomas and Woolsey Fires.



QUICK FACTS

- Research shows children experience severe reactions to stress following a natural disaster and youth have a greater risk than adults to develop mental health conditions, if not treated.
- Children who have been impacted by a natural disaster can often have physiological, emotional, and behavioral reactions that can impact their daily lives.
